Building Better Babies

Right from the Beginning...Early Aggressive Nutrition for the Premature and Very Low Birthweight Infant

This presentation reviews the presentation of the premature, LBW and VLBW infant as a “nutritional emergency” and offers a review of the latest research regarding nutritional management of these infants. Current recommendations regarding early, aggressive parenteral and enteral nutrition, current recommendations for protein delivery, and strategies for the use of human milk and human milk fortification will be presented. An overview of the short and long-term effects inadequate nutrition in this vulnerable population will also be explored.

Immuno-Nutrients: Potentially Doing So Much Good with So Little

This presentation reviews the physiology of the infant gut as it relates to the developing immune system. The role of human milk in the development of immune function will be outlined, as well as the growing interest in use of anti-oxidants, nucleotides, prebiotics, probiotics, and carotenoids in feeding the term and preterm infant. The presentation acquaints even a mixed-practice audience to an overview of basic neonatal immunity, the current use of probiotics to reduce the incidence of NEC in premature infants, and the role of supplemented immunonutrients in the infant diet.

Spit Happens! An Overview of GER in the Neonates

GER has become a frequent diagnosis in the premature population but the evidence of “what is reflux” in this population, as well as sorting out appropriate interventions and therapies remains a significant clinical dilemma. The presentation will provide an overview on GER including epidemiology, clinical presentation, and current diagnostic studies. A comprehensive review of feeding, supportive, pharmacologic, medical and surgical strategies based on 2009 NASPGHAN recommendations for GER and GERD in the term and preterm infant is included.

Intrauterine Substance Exposure: Impact on Infants.

This presentation provides an overview of maternal substance abuse during pregnancy including an evolution of the types of substance used, epidemiologic data and impact on maternal and newborn health. The substances used include methamphetamine, designer-drugs, inhalants and prescription drugs, as well as the phenomena of polydrug use with tobacco and alcohol. The toxicity of the substance-abusing home is also reviewed. Current intervention models and long term intervention and assessment of the infant are described.
